- WHO advises fully recovered patients to stay home in isolation for a further 14 days. Is there underlying evidence that shows that clinically recovered patients can still transmit the disease?

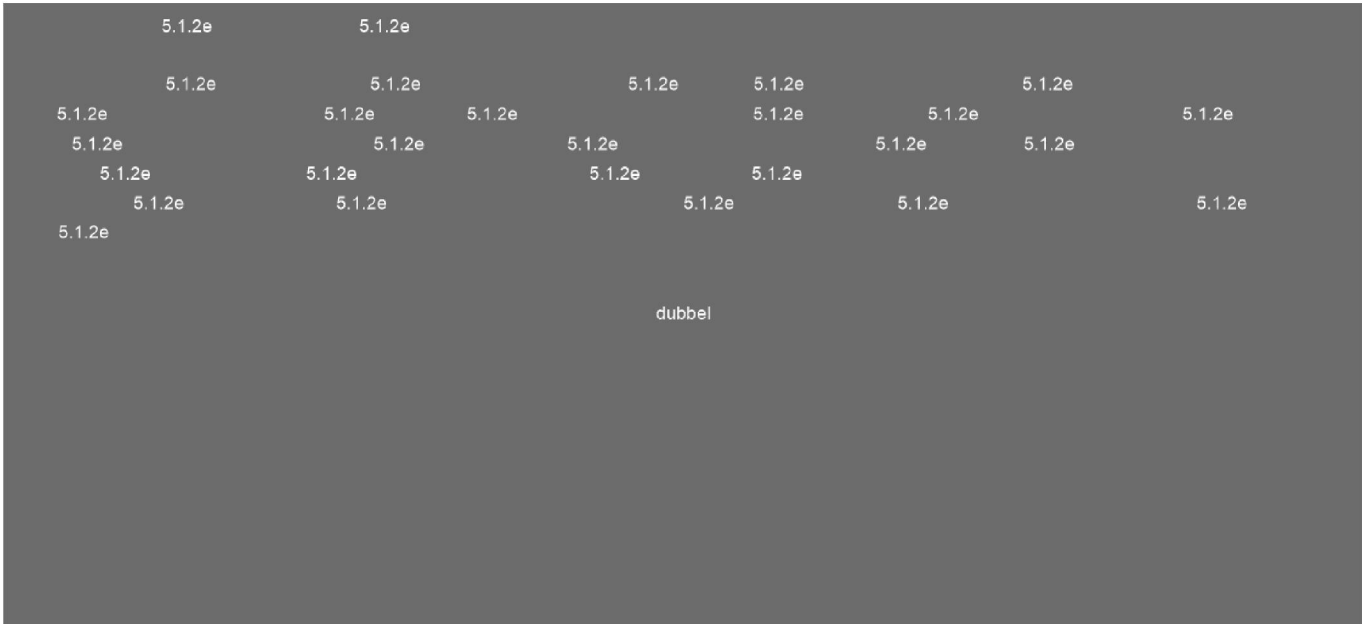
